OUR CORNERSTONE — OUR HISTORY

The first attempt at locating the scattered church membership possibilities among the Scandinavian Lutheran people in Stevens Point was, as it is now recalled, done by Northern Wisconsin's Norwegian Missionary pastor, Nils Brandt, pastor at Rock River and other congregations.

From 1857 and on, Brandt visited this place (Stevens Point) once or twice each year. It is reported that the first church service was conducted in the home of Joel B. Scott, and a few still living do recall this first church service. In 1863, Pastor A. Mikkelsen became the pastor at Scandinavia and did pastoral work in the adjoining areas. As often as possible, he visited Stevens Point until 1870, when a parish called *New Hope and adjoining congregations* was created by carving it out of the original Scandinavia parish. The New Hope congregation called Pastor N. Berge to be its minister.

Until 1873, this (Stevens Point) congregation was judged to be a "Mission church" but with an administrative structure identical to that of independent congregations. But on April 27, 1873, the Norwegian Evangelical Lutheran Congregation in Stevens Point was established, which continues to be known as Trinity congregation. In 1873, the congregation had 28 male members of whom nearly all are now (in 1898) dead, have moved away, or have withdrawn from the congregation. Also on April 27, 1873, the parish called N. Berge to be its pastor; and Jorgen O. Wrolstad, Anders Johnson, and Helge Halverson were elected trustees. This action permitted incorporation procedures to be initiated; so that by April 26, 1874, Trinity congregation was officially created. But the congregation had at this time no church property, so church services were conducted for some time in the Presbyterian, church.

There had existed for some time a German Lutheran congregation in Stevens Point; therefore on April 20, 1874, Trinity purchased a half interest in the (German) church and property. In 1875, Trinity received the deed for its share in this jointly-owned property, which was located on the corner of Elk and Shaurette streets. This property is still (in 1898) jointly owned.

The Rev. Berge continued as the congregation's pastor until 1881 when, because of illness, he found it necessary to resign. Pastor Musdres (sic) visited the church occasionally during Pastor Berge's illness. In 1880, the first Sunday school was organized by Ole L. Sande, Jacob Pederson, and John A. Murat, and this Sunday school was operated successfully for many years. On May 8, 1881, the Rev. Nils Forde was called to be pastor in Trinity; Pastor Forde's call also included the congregation at Amherst. From August, 1881 to November, 1892, Pastor Forde served as our pastor; but at the later date, he moved to Starbuck, Pope County, Minnesota

In 1889, a committee consisting of Anders Rohjeld, O. L. Sande, L. R. Anderson, and J. A. Murat, was asked to work out a constitution and by-laws for the congregation. On March 4, 1889, the congregation had been re-incorporated under the State Laws of Wisconsin; by May 3, 1892, the constitutional work was completed and officially accepted by the congregation. An attempt was made in the summer of 1892 to acquire some property of its own by buying the Episcopal Church building on Clark Street. But this attempt failed.

On November 20, 1892, Pastor I. G. Monson was called to serve the Amherst-Stevens Point congregations, and he began his work a month later. In the late eighties, a choir was organized under the direction of O. L. Sande and L. R. Anderson; it is said that this choir contributed a great deal to congregational interest and morale. In 1892, the Sunday school work was revived by L. R. Anderson, Ole and Gunder Sande, and others, L. R. Anderson continuing to act as its superintendent until 1897 when he was replaced by Ole Christiansen, the current Sunday school superintendent.

The "West-Side" Ladies' Aid was established early in 1890, and the "East-Side" unit in December, 1890. Similarly a Girls' Club was organized in 1892. These organizations are all active (in 1898) and are real forces in the congregation.

Early in the nineties, the congregation selected a committee (including both sexes) to work out "ways and means" for the purchase of, or the building of, a church. It is hoped that these organizations mentioned above and the members of this new committee will find the answers and their well-begun work soon completed. Pastor Monson resigned in November, 1896, and on December 27, 1896, Pastor Christian Hovde was called. He did begin his work early in 1897. During the interim, Pastor Magelsen of Iola visited the congregation whenever possible.

For several years, Trinity had tried to sell its share in the church property jointly owned with the German congregation. Despite a failure to do this, Trinity voted on March 6, 1898 to buy a lot on the corner of Strongs Avenue and Brawley Street, and the purchase contract was completed by March 21, 1898. Funds for this property purchase were provided primarily by the two Ladies' Aid Groups and the Girls' Club; the remaining money needed was furnished by the Building Fund Committee.

It was on March 20, 1898, that the congregation's name was legally changed to Trinity Congregation of the Evangelical Lutheran Church. (Translator's note: Despite a great deal of synodical name shifting between 1898 and 1952, it is interesting that the congregation's official name reads today (1952) exactly as it did in 1898). Also on March 20, 1898, the congregation voted to build a new church, the design and detail to be determined by Architect Jeffers. Supervision of the building project was assigned to a Building Committee, which included A. P. Lewis, L. R. Anderson, H. Holen, and J. A. Murat. The church is being built by funds received through voluntary contributions, collected by the Building Fund Committee. Also a considerable amount of the materials needed for construction is being donated by Stevens Point business men and other area citizens. The congregation appreciates this help since its total membership includes only about 60 persons of both sexes. Throughout the years, the Lord has been helpful. May many hearts be opened (sic) so they may want to share in the building of this House of God, as living proofs that there still are persons willing and daring to defend the teachings of the Evangelical Lutheran Church; may there be many willing to help us complete this house which we in the name of Jesus Christ have begun to build, and to the honor of the Holy Trinity.

We conclude herewith this first attempt at a history of this congregation up to this date.

What brought us together as a church family in this century, this country, this community? This timeline invites you to record family milestones, relating them to events or religious and political thinking that may have influenced your

personal history.

The 40 years just before Trinity's first century saw Wisconsin change from a territory to a state (1848). Thousands of settlers came — many seeking freedom from revolutions in Europe. Travel became easier. (First steamship across Atlantic, 1830; railroad reached Stevens Point, 1871; stage-coach days here 1850-1870). Available land. (Homestead Act, 1862; cheap land offered by railroads.) Lumbering provided employment. News and ideas traveled faster. (Morse

telegraph, 1844; Transatlantic Cable, 1865.) Thinking was influenced by: Marx's Communist Manifesto, Darwin's Origin of Species, Pasteur's germ theory, Civil War and race relations, Victorian era, and free public education. Industry was affected by the discovery of oil, the invention of the Bessemer steel process, and the aftereffects of the Industrial Revolution.

Stevens Point, named after the point on the Wisconsin River where George Stevens landed in 1839, had its first church service in 1847 in a village of 20 families. It had 458 people when it got its name in 1850. It became a city in 1858.

Thus we come to the time marking Trinity's first hundred

years.






NILS FORDE 1881-1892

THE BUILDING WHICH served the German and Norwegian congregations jointly, 1874-1898, no longer exists. Mrs. Henry Pesch, member of the last German class to be confirmed in the building, recalls that it was moved to Strongs Ave., now the site of Sentry Insurance Home Office.



"THE OLD WHITE CHURCH" at the corner of Strongs and Brawley served our congregation slightly more than a half-century. The Ladies' Aid supplied the \$600 needed to buy the lot in 1898, and their financial help continued to carry a large part of the congregation's expenses during the building and finishing of the church. Their Story and Clark reed organ, purchased for the first church on Elk and Shaurette, was used in this church also until the pipe organ was installed in 1928. The Church of Christ congregation bought this building from us in 1953 and used it for about 15 years. It is now being converted into a private dwelling.

OUR FIRST RESIDENT Pastor was Theodore R. Ringoen, called in 1913. To provide a residence for his family, the congregation bought a house and two lots at the intersection of Church and Brawley. The house and one lot were sold at the time this modern parsonage was built in 1919 at a cost of \$9000. It remained our parsonage until it was decided in 1967 to provide our pastors with a housing allowance rather than a house. Pastor Holtan bought this house from the congregation but later moved to Park Ridge. Presently our pastors live at 3717 Jordan Lane (Oliver) and 717 Green Ave. (Litzer),



THE CONTEMPORARY DESIGN of our church won an award for architect Donn Hougen in 1951. A major remodeling in 1970 reversed the interior of the church, gave us a more convenient entry, and included installation of a new 33-rank pipe organ. The present baptized membership of the congregation is 1662. The church seats about 440; at the highest attendance mark, set Dec. 16, 1973, 1024 people attended the two Sunday morning services.



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Commitment: A Cause for Rejoicing


Rejoice! Rejoice! A time for celebration is upon us. A time of thankfulness, a time of remembering, and a time of joy.
