Pastor's Column

From Epiphany to Lent

I have three things to share this month. First, a note that the season of Lent is coming early this year. Easter falls on April Fool's Day which will mean that, like St. Paul, we can all think of ourselves as fools for Christ. That places Ash Wednesday on February 14. As usual, we will have a service at noon and another at 6:30 that evening. And, we will begin our Lenten potluck suppers that evening at 5:15. Last year I saw first hand how popular these suppers and the following services are here at Trinity. I am excited about our coming Lenten season and the ways that it will focus our spiritual journeys.

Each Lent, we try to find a fitting theme to follow. This year the theme is being set by a group of congregations whose pastors will rotate in a "round robin." Each pastor will prepare one sermon and rotate among the participating churches, while the congregation stays at home to celebrate Lent in their usual way. After consulting a number of people, the worship planners have decided to use the popular Holden Evening Prayer for our Lenten services again this year. Our services will be at 6:30 pm each week.

Second, I want to let you know that we are proceeding in a good way regarding our search for a new Director of the Trinity Learning Center and Preschool. We have interviewed a number of good candidates and are close to making a decision. By the time of the publication of this article, I am confident we will already have made a selection. Unfortunately, this article needs to go to print before our final decision can be made. I'll be announcing the new director soon. Thanks are due to members of the Personnel Committee for their diligent work that brought us such fine candidates who have performed so well in the interview process.

Finally, a word of apology. I jumped the gun in previously reporting that we would try to move our Praise Band service to a weekly event. Upon further conversation at the worship committee meeting, it was agreed that our current goal would be to try to return to having the band play at both services on the fourth Sundays, and the second service on the second Sundays. The mistaken announcement led to some very good conversation about how we can enliven worship at all our services. We are still seeking an interim director for the band. Until one is found, we will need to continue our current practice of having the band lead us only at our fourth Sunday services.

Making public apologies is humbling, and we all need humble leaders. How refreshing it would be to hear more humble discourse from our state and national capitals. Let us pray that our new year will bring blessings to our

congregation, our community, our region and our nation—and peace in our world.

GROCERY DONATIONS

Interfaith Food Pantry (IFP), located in Plover, will be the recipient of our grocery cart donations during the month of February. They distribute food and other necessities on the 2nd and 4th Tuesdays of the month. Items they are most in need of include cereal; all kinds of canned fruit; pasta; pasta sauces; and health products ranging from body wash and shampoo to toothpaste and toothbrushes.

IFP distributes about 14,000 pounds of food a night. Much of the food is donated, but they also need cash donations to purchase items that haven't been donated. For instance, Mel Dow, the director, needs to purchase between 250 and 300 dozen eggs each night of distribution, so your cash donations are appreciated also. Just place them in the small blue box on the counter in the Narthex.

During 2017, between 20 and 30 new families came to the pantry each night they were open. November was an all-time high with 240 families each of the two nights. Of that number, one third of the families were seniors. In spite of the high numbers, each family only asked for help an average of slightly more than 5 times in 2017. What does that mean? It shows that families are using the pantry only as a safety net when they need help. One reason that the numbers are climbing is that the government is cutting Food Share (food stamps) back. When the state cuts back, there is more pressure on the food pantries.

Would you like to tour the Interfaith Food Pantry? Mel Dow, the IFP director, invites you to visit. So that he does not have too many people come at one time, please call 715 -347-2689 to make an appointment. He would love to show you the facilities and how their distribution nights work.

It takes between 35-40 volunteers each distribution night. If you think you'd like to help out, give Mel a call. Thanks for your generosity. Let's continue to fill the grocery cart, not once but several times throughout the month of February.

Where Are They Now?—Catching Up With Missionaries Past

Ever wonder what happened to the Grow-Hansons, Peter and Sarah whom (with their two sons, Elijah and Simon) we sponsored in Senegal or to Kristen Opalinski in South Africa or, in more recent memory, Kevin Jacobson in Suriname? A bit of googling brought results.

From 2001-2011, Peter Hanson served in Senegal, West Africa, first as head of a cultural center in Dakar and then as a seminary instructor and mentor for pastors and other leaders in the Lutheran Church of Senegal. He is now the Lead Pastor of Christ the King Lutheran Church in St. Paul, Minnesota, where he also serves as head of staff, overseeing staff development and providing input to lay leadership groups. At Christ the King, he continues to emphasize God's Global Mission as "staff liaison to the Global Mission Team and Local Mission Partners." (If you carefully look around Trinity, you'll find gifts from Senegal generously presented to us.)

Our next missionary, whom we supported from 2012-2013, volunteered for the ELCA Young Adults in Global Mission program and, from headquarters in a suburb of Johannesburg, worked as a communications officer for the Lutheran Communion in Southern Africa. Following her service, Kristin Opalinski visited us in 2014 with an eyecatching power point presentation in Fellowship Hall. Her facebook page lists her as a Design and Marketing Associate at Three Stones Consulting, "a strategy firm for the social sector specializing in financial sustainability, strategic direction, social impact, and resiliency...We work with those who bring a passion for social change and seek strategic direction." Now living in Chicago, she also acts as Communications Manager for Mission Advancement at the ELCA.

Finally, from 2014-2016 we welcomed Kevin Jacobson as our missionary from Suriname, South America. With deep roots in western Wisconsin, Reverend Jacobson was able to visit Trinity twice in three years, explaining his responsibilities as Pastor of Maartin Luther Kerk (church) in Paramaribo, the capital city. (Yes, he needed to preach in Dutch, the official language.) Currently he serves as the Assistant Director of Outreach in Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service, which, from its headquarters in Baltimore, Maryland, "welcomes and supports refugees and migrants entering the United States." (Most recently he was sighted at last summer's Triennial Gathering of the Women of the ELCA in Minneapolis.)

We thank our missionaries for doing God's work in far-off lands and, once back in this country, for their continued service to the church and its mission.

Mary Coin by Marisa Silver (F Sil)

In 1936 Dorothea Lange snaps *Migrant* Mother, an iconic Depression era picture of young mother resting by the side of the road in central California. This photo is the inspiration for this story when survival was a day-to-day thing for her migrant farmworker subject.

The Nakano Thrift Shop by Hiromi Kawakami (F Kaw) The thrift shop is the locale, but the stories of human relationships belong to the customers and staff. The unusual, unrelated, but intertwined characters make for a delightful tale.

A group of 30 returning students helped organize the event, receiving grants from a local thrift store and Thrivent Financial to purchase materials. Those students coordinated the work of more than 500 incoming students over three hour shifts one Tuesday afternoon. After a brief introduction to LWR's mission, students broke up into small groups and assembled a total of 134 Fleece Tie Blankets. The project was a "joyful collaboration;" it offered a good way to talk about what it means to be an ELCA college and the global partnerships and relationships that bless the mission of Luther College," said Mike Blair, campus pastor.

From Our Bishop

In Christ God was reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting the message of reconciliation to us (2 Corinthians 5:19).

The five days I spent in Vancouver, British Columbia was a rich experience with colleague bishops from the United States and Canada. We had gathered for the annual Bishops Academy and the theme was "First Nations Peoples: Spirituality, Theology, Reconciliation."

It was significant that we met in Canada where 10% of the population is First Nations People, compared to 1% or less in the United States. A sign of this stronger presence were front-page newspaper editorials and news stories about issues facing First Nation peoples, something we rarely see in the U.S. media.

Canada has invested time and energy in addressing issues related to First Nations People or Native Americans as we might say. In 2008 the Truth and Reconciliation Commission was organized in response to the abuse inflicted upon native peoples through the Indian Residential school system. The introduction to their work reads: "There is an emerging and compelling desire to put the events of the past behind us so that we can work towards a stronger and healthier future."

The speakers at our event were Prairie Rose Seminole, ELCA Program Director for the American Indian, Alaska Native Ministries; Dr. Martin Brokenleg who served as Professsor of Native American studies over 30 years at Augustana University, Sioux Falls, and The Right Reverend Mark MacDonald, the Anglican Church of Canada's first National Indigenous Anglican Bishop. All of them referenced the work Canada has done in trying to come to terms with its history. As Prairie Rose told us, "you've done nothing wrong but you are benefitting from a history and a system of injustice and genocide."

Through stories, a blanket exercise, and personal reflections we learned once again of the horror inflicted upon native peoples in North America – the displacement of populations, the dehumanization of people, the enormous suffering and death. The Church's complicity also became painfully obvious, beginning with the Doctrine of Discovery. Papal rulings in the 14th century gave Christian explorers the right to lay claim to lands they "discovered" and to claim them for Christian Monarchs. In the centuries since, the Church has been involved "up to its eyeballs," as one speaker said, in the dehumanization of indigenous people. "The Church participated openly and in animated ways, with ideologies and images that were intrinsically genocidal," was the comment of Bishop MacDonald.

But there is the possibility for hope and healing. Reconciliation happens, said the bishop, when victims

reclaim their humanity and not because oppressors suddenly wake up to the reality of their evil. Victims are reconciled with what has happened in their history and oppressors are invited to repair the damage to their own humanity as they are invited into this well of grace.

Bishop MacDonald spoke of churches as "incubators of reconciliation" and lifted up 4 ways that congregations can participate in God's mission of reconciling love. 1. One is to accompany the suffering. Reach out and listen to the stories of those who have suffered and endured centuries of oppression and neglect. 2. Another is to be a place of truth telling. Reconciliation only happens as the painful realities are noted and acknowledged. 3. Another is for congregations to be places of exemplary transformation by which, I think, he meant that we listen and learn and grow and change from interaction with the other. 4. Finally, we are all called to deeper levels of discipleship. We are called to integrate the will of God into our lives. With this I am reminded of the words of Dietrich Bonhoeffer that it should be the ardent prayer of every Christian "to know and do the will of God."

Bishop Elaine Sauer of the Manitoba/Northwestern Ontario Synod said she learned through her work with the Truth and Reconciliation process the importance of showing up. "We need to go, show up, and listen. Don't look for resources or develop programs, just listen and learn."

As I think about the many issues before us in this country, including coming to terms with our treatment of Native Americans, I think we would do well to listen and learn so that we can live into a stronger and healthier future. One of the recurring themes from our speakers was that God also meets us and speaks to us outside the realm of the Church.

One of the oldest Native American ministries in the Lutheran Church is right here in the East Central Synod of Wisconsin. Church of the Wilderness is a Lutheran congregation and part of the Stockbridge-Munsee Community near Bowler. Their ancestral roots are in Stockbridge, Massachusetts having been forced into relocation several times before ending up in Wisconsin.

I wonder if God might be calling us in this synod, surrounded as we are by a rich heritage of First Nations People, to listen and learn and to be an "incubator of reconciliation". We grow into a stronger and healthier future when we build community, hear the stories of others, and are transformed by the power of the Spirit at work among us. God has given us this promise in the Good News of Jesus Christ.
