Dear Trinity Members,

I want to report to you on how our search for musical leadership is going. We are nearing the end of our search and have been considering a number of very gifted people, including some of our current staff. Right now, we are trying to choose between two very good options. While we had thought of our needs as being met by a couple part time persons, there have been some highly talented people who have wanted us to consider putting the pieces together into one full-time position. At the time of my writing this message, the committee is trying to determine which of those two options will be best for the future of Trinity as we strive to restore our music and worship program to a distinguished level. We feel that either option can take us in that direction. We hope to be able to make an announcement very soon regarding which way we hope to go. The process will be for the search committee to make a recommendation to the Worship and Personnel committees. If approved, the recommendation will then go to the church council for final ratification.

Please pray for the committee as we come near to the end of this long and healthy process. The worship and music evaluation process began about one year ago and all those involved are pleased with the progress and confident that God has been leading us to a creative and appropriate conclusion.

I also want to share a second thought. You may recall that I have been recruited by people from the Synod to participate in a July trip to South Africa to meet people in our companion synod and from our companion congregation, St. Katarina in Rustenburg. The congregation is generously supporting me for this trip. Two members of the congregation have also volunteered to make this trip with me as representatives of Trinity. They are David Blado and Bill Taugner. I am hoping that some of you will want to assist them in making their trip possible. I am collecting money from members of the congregation in support of their travel. If any of you would like to make a donation to support them, please make your checks out to Trinity and mark them for the Africa trip. I will personally receive and

gather the contributions. We will split the proceeds and apply them to the air fare for David and Bill. I hope you will join me in making a contribution.


Summer Music

Matthew Desmond enrolled in the sociology PhD program at the University of Wisconsin at Madison. This study involves poor and rich people, there is mutual dependence and struggle, eviction was such a process.

Matthew moved into Tobin's trailer park to begin his book. Here is where he could meet the people getting pink papers. He could also meet the owners. Later he moved into Milwaukee's North Side.

In Milwaukee he lived in a rooming house where he shared the living space with other tenants. Here he became a field worker researching and writing about this topic. Matthew was always open to everyone as he was writing about the problems of poverty. He was accepted by all and many shared their experiences and stories with him. A side note Matthew mentioned the harder feat of a field worker is not getting in; it's leaving.

Driven by Donald Driver (796.33 DR)

Donald Driver is a legendary NFL receiver, all time reception and yard leader for the Green Bay Packers, and Dancing With The Stars Champion writes about looking back on his life and career.

The book is a great read and very interesting. Donald has come from homeless to hero and tells of his journey on and off Lambeau Field. I think this book could be an enjoyable read for all ages. He has had so many experiences good and not so good.

Donald Driver retired from his football career in 2012. In 2004 he and his wife (Betina) started the Donald Driver

Foundation to provide assistance for homeless mothers and underprivileged children. They have received many honors for this service to the community.
