We have audited the December 31, 2020 Treasurer's Annual Report and Endowment Memorial Gifts Committee Report as published in the 2020 Trinity Lutheran Church Annual Meeting Report. We have used the audit techniques that we, as a committee, consider necessary.

The Treasurer's report is presented on a cash basis. Revenue is recognized when received rather when earned. Expenditures are recognized when paid rather than when incurred. This method is consistent with prior years.

A balance sheet, listing assets and liabilities, is not prepared. Depreciation expense relating to fixed assets is not recognized. This is also consistent with prior years.

In our opinion, the December 31, 2020 Treasurer's Annual Report and Endowment Memorial Gifts Committee Report fairly presents the cash transactions of Trinity Lutheran Church for the year ended December 31, 2020.

Report of the Pastor

While it is usually a bad idea to try to judge a congregation's ministry vitality by the numbers, during these ongoing pandemic days, we have not been able to observe much of our typical ministry impact. So, in lieu of better measures, I will share some of the numbers that account for the kind of impact and outreach that we have had this past year.

First, our financial picture has remained relatively strong. I'll leave the details to the treasurer, but I will thank the people of Trinity here for their strong and generous ongoing support, in spite of our need to restrict some of the ways we usually work, worship, and fellowship together.

During the past summer, we began meeting in person for worship again. Our parking lot services averaged around 50 people per Sunday. That number has been slowly rising since we opened our doors to live worship in the sanctuary. We are now averaging around 70 people between two services. In addition, we continue to have high response to our broadcast services. Sunday mornings average around 230 views (which may include several viewers per engagement) and our Wednesday evening services typically get around 150 views, many of which continue to be from other regions of the country. Sometimes anomalies occur. We had a viewership of over 600 for one of our Band led services—and a memorial service for our friend Sue Ann McAbee was broadcast on Facebook to a viewership of 840 souls. We don't actually know what these numbers mean, but they are a good indication that Trinity is reaching many people at home as they continue to exercise caution regarding a return to live worship. I want to offer my thanks to the office staff and the worship and music team for continuing to make Trinity's worship lively and engaging.

One worship number that is concrete and meaningful is that between four services, we had 233 people join us for live Christmas eve worship. What a joy it was to see so many people here together over the course of the afternoon and evening. Our online broadcasts of those services reached another 550 people.

Sadly, we have not yet found a way to return to live Sunday School. We hope that with children now being vaccinated, this will change in the coming weeks. We are starting to see young families and children returning to worship and I want to thank Todd Lewis for being available each Sunday to spend some educational time with the children each Sunday as worship concludes.

One of the pleasant surprises during this period is the number of new people who have found Trinity to be a trusted place for worship and ministry. We will soon be having a new member Sunday where the congregation can meet the several families that are eager to join us.

I will conclude my report by stating two new ministry opportunities that have developed over the past year. Area pastors and churches have founded a neighborhood helping organization called One Big Tent. It seeks to assist neighbors in need with financial, social, and administrative support. Trinity is a partner in this important community ministry. Related to One Big Tent is the desire by our congregations to host and welcome Afghan refugees that are now coming to Stevens Point. Trinity's response to this need is being handled through our Global and Local Outreach Committee.

With you all, I pray that 2022 will bring a restoration of normalcy to our lives and to Trinity's worship and ministry. God bless you all in the coming year.

Youth and Family Coordinator Report

"Holding Loosely." Those two words might accurately describe what we're all doing in life right now? They appropriately enough also served as the theme for this past year's ELCA Youth Ministry Network "Extravaganza", an annual training and networking event I'm always excited to be a part of. Like many things, the February 4th-6th opportunity, which is typically held in-person, moved online. Yet the support and encouragement those days together offered (for all 1700+ of us connected only through technology), was so needed and I was incredibly grateful for. How can each of us during this time of so many challenges in our world hold more loosely to our own plans and trust more greatly in the love and grace and promises of God?

This year at Trinity, I have done my best to lean into those promises every day as we navigate this very different time in life and ministry, trying to limit risk to youth and families whenever possible, but still sharing faith together and offering opportunities, support and connection.

Our Confirmation program has remained active. The Wednesday night first and second-year group wrapped up online in early May, completing their overview year on the books of the Bible. Families were surveyed and we elected not to attend Confirmation Camp this past June, due to changes necessitated by COVID-19. Over the summer and early fall, I met with members of the third year Confirmation group, as they prepared for the next step on their faith journeys. On Reformation Sunday, October 31^s, the 10 of them affirmed the promises of their baptism, as surrounded by family and friends, they were Confirmed at a very special inperson worship service. This fall's Wednesday group has started the year meeting in- person, socially distanced each week in Trinity's sanctuary.

On the morning of May 30th, we gathered for worship in Trinity's parking lot to celebrate the graduation of 21 incredible high school seniors at our annual Baccalaureate Service. There just aren't the words to convey all they have meant to me and to our congregation, but this one Sunday each year, gives us a small chance to share our prayers and hope for their futures. They are already greatly missed!

In the Spring, we prepared 37 care packages which were sent off to Trinity college students. I met with youth for lunches each week over the summer months and held several informational meetings in anticipation of our group being a part of next summer's still currently planned ELCA Youth Gathering in Minneapolis. Our team took part in WWSP's "Trivia 51" Weekend and we have continued to offer online opportunities for youth to connect over Google Meet.

In November, we kicked off, "Faith Stories and More," a shorter Sunday morning offering of stories and activities, for our youngest members, as they gather toward the end of each service. I regularly share children's messages during worship and have provided email and online resources to school-age families throughout the year. The responses to a recent survey, which was emailed to families, supported this more cautious approach before a return to a larger in-person faith formation, such as Sunday School.

At Trinity, I coordinate and often write the "Inspiring Worship All Week" devotions by members, which are included in the Trinity Weekly emails and found on our website. I assisted with the Holiday Basket Project, as Trinity once again came together to sponsor 4 families this holiday season. Thanks so much to Andria Bena for all her work on this ministry! I help manage and stock, along with so many faithful others, Trinity's "Little Free Pantry," an important outreach to those in our community facing food insecurity.

I continue to work with Trinity's technology needs, not only in the office, but throughout the building. This year we replaced nearly all of our computers, due to outdated operating systems and navigated repeated email and server issues, which have become a longer-range project. The move to online livestreaming of our worship services, prompted us not only to expand components and software of our sanctuary sound and video booth, but its physical footprint, as well. We are very grateful for all the time that Trinity member Steve Jensen and friend Jim Martin shared as they constructed the needed addition to that space. Thanks also to the technology team of Pat Gerbitz, Michael Martin and Charlie McKee for the invaluable resources they have been to me and many ways they support Trinity in the area of technology. Thanks also to all those who have assisted in any way with livestreaming, slides or camera operations to make sure our worship services are available to those who cannot be here in person.

In Stevens Point, I serve as a member of the Hunger and Poverty Prevention Partnership of Portage County and co-chair the Empty Bowls Committee. I meet regularly with a group of youth ministry leaders in our area and work closely with Crossways Camping Ministry whenever possible.

In the midst of so much uncertainty and change, you should know that we are blessed (and I am every day) to have and work with the staff that Trinity does, especially Doris and Tammy in the office, Glen taking care of our building and grounds and Amy in the Learning Center (as well as Melissa and her entire staff staff). They may not be as visible to everyone, especially during this time, but every day the work they have never stopped doing, and the people they are, keep our ministry and mission moving forward.

I'm so grateful for the support this past year of Youth and Family Committee members Sue Acaley and Christine Kienbaum, who have been advocates, sounding boards and so much more. I'm thankful for the parents and families who have been a part of events, programming and conversations and the youth of this church who are gifts in every experience we have been fortunate enough to share.

We have no way of knowing what things will look like when all that we're currently experiencing is over (and even when that will be?). So much has already changed, but I hold out hope that God's plans for Trinity will emerge from this time and continue to connect and carry us the days ahead. Thank you so much for all your support and prayers. I'm honored every day to be a part of the Trinity family!

Amy's abilities in keeping a competent and caring staff, maintaining good staff morale in a challenging time, and keeping the children and staff healthy is a credit to her.

I would be remiss if I didn't thank the Church Council for their service. Trinity is very fortunate to have the leadership of these committed individuals. Thank you to Edye Ray, Sue Acaley, Jeff Martin, Donna Watson, Jon Houtman, Megan Espe, Diane Witte, Kristi Bean, Roberta Holthusen, Joel Lemke, and Brenda Saeger-Wroblewski. It is a pleasure to work with you.

A few highlights of 2021:

We completed our pledge to Crossways Camping Ministry sooner than planned. We enhanced our worship through upgrades to our technology. And we made the building more inviting for our members and visitors by changing the doors on the west side of the building.

Trinity Learning Center provided essential child care services for families in Portage County.

We enjoyed the outdoors during our parking lot services and we were able to begin worshipping in the sanctuary. Thank you to the volunteers behind the scenes and our worship assistants that make it all possible.

We confirmed 10 students and celebrated their accomplishment with their families.

Trinity provided a beacon of hope and light to our members, friends, and the community through another year of uncertainty. Thank you to you, the members, for all you do to support Trinity through your gifts of time, talent, and treasure.

Buildings & Grounds Committee

The Buildings and Grounds Committee conscientiously carried out its mission to maintain Trinity's facilities and grounds.

2021 Accomplishments:

- -WPS brought Trinity's gas line up to code by routing our gas line to the outside and installing a new gas meter on the east side of the building. A wooden box with a lid was made to encase the underground pipe lines.
- -Fresh air controls were installed on our 10 air handlers. This will improve the rate of air exchange throughout the building.
- -Partitions were made and installed in the sound booth to provide social distancing during the peak of the pandemic.
- -A gradual change throughout the building to lever door handles will be made. This year the church office was done.
- -Preparation for the TLC&P's climber and rubber flooring was done.
- -The north east exterior door #6 and the west door #2, with the mail slot were replaced.
- -A deteriorating baffle for the insinkerator was installed.
- -A water softening system was installed for the dishwasher.
- -The first floor north hallway and landing had new flooring installed.
- -The circuit board on the Booster Heater in the kitchen was replaced.
- -Two areas next to the south side of the building in the playground area and around a tree in the south playground were prepared and green artificial grass was installed.
- -The sound booth was extended.
- -Two lights to brighten a dark hallway by the Coke machine were installed.
- -LED T8 lights have been installed in the first floor classrooms and hallway.
- -The two ash trees by the south entrance were treated.
- Two new floor mats will be placed in the west entrance.
- -LED lights have been installed in the Library/Chapel valance.

- Security cameras at the south entrance and TLC&P entrance were installed.
- -Various floors and carpets have been cleaned.
- -Throughout the year there were various HVAC and plumbing repairs.
- -Ground's work done: weeding, trimming, planting, transplanting, removing the bushes along Rogers Street and sprinkler work.

Christian Education Committee

Sunday School

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, Sunday school was cancelled. During part of the year, Todd Lewis forwarded to participating Sunday school families various materials relating to the current church season. Starting in November during worship, Todd met with children in the Narthex to share a story and project.

Sacramental Preparation

Pastor Clay met with families to discuss Baptism. The pastor also led Communion preparation classes when possible during the year.

Splash!

Splash! is a faith formation program that includes resources for families with young children who are pre-Sunday School age. Yearly resources are given to each family including a Bible, songs, and other great tips to help parents live out their Baptismal promises. Mary Lou Bonikowske is the coordinator for this program. This year 1st Bibles were given to 1-year olds, and baby blankets and sweaters were delivered to newborns.

Confirmation

On Reformation Sunday, October 31, ten tenth-graders were confirmed at the Affirmation of Baptism service. Currently, there are 14 students in 7th and 8th grade confirmation that meet weekly on Wednesday evenings during the school year. FaithInkubators, along with Bible Project, are the curriculums being used. The program centers on a review of the Old and New Testaments and Luther's Small Catechism. Serving the church and the community, when safe and appropriate, is also emphasized. There are seven 9th graders in the third year Mentor Program that met periodically throughout the year.

These students are working to delve deeper into their faith working with mentors to form their Faith Statements and develop their Faith Project while continuing service, when possible, to the church and community. Students did not attend camp this year due to covid concerns.

Adult Education

Pastor Clay led several small-group discussions during the year (some virtually).

Operation Christmas Child

Greg and Krista Olson coordinated this program. Members from the church helped to fill shoe boxes to disperse to children around the world.

Other Activities

Unfortunately, due to the pandemic, Soup Suppers were not offered during Lent.

Global and Local Outreach Committee

The Global and Local Outreach (GLO) Committee expresses appreciation to all Trinity members who, through their generosity, make these ministries possible. The GLO committee has as its mission "to encourage and provide opportunities for the congregation in telling the Gospel of Jesus Christ through word and deed to all the people within and without the community of faith". This report details those ways in which we carried out our mission in 2021.

Due to the pandemic, our coordination of greeters for Sunday services has been put on hold, as has the fair-trade coffee and chocolate sales. We continue to send a note to first time visitors to Trinity, acknowledging their visit and inviting them back to Trinity.

The Stephen Ministers at Trinity have faithfully provided an important ministry to congregational and community members in need of additional support. Throughout the year those Trinity Stephen Ministers who have provided Christian care are: Sue Acaley, Barb Brilowski, Sue Clussman, Katie Ellenz, Sandra Hagness, Gail Pucci and Bill Taugner. We thank them for their caregiving.

On a rotating basis, four food pantries (Operation Bootstrap, Interfaith Food Pantry, Mobile Pantry and the Salvation Army) receive our monthly donations of monetary support, as well as the continued donation of some food and household items. Donations for 2021 for the food pantries totaled \$1,580. A total of \$2,495 was received for World Hunger.

The GLO committee maintains contact with Rev. Philip Knutson, Missionary in South Africa. The Loose Change appeal included receipt of funding of \$4,452.04 for: Bread for The World, the Stevens Point Warming Center, St. Katharina's/S. Africa Covid relief, Lutheran Disaster Response, United Way Community Diaper Drive, Lutheran Social Services, Bethany Home -Waupaca, Lutheran World Relief, Project Fresh Start, Empty Bowls, LSS- Afghan refugees, and UWSP Cupboard. The appeal for school supplies and monetary donations for the Lutheran World Relief –School Kits and Project Fresh Start was held jointly with Charity Circle and the appeal for Empty Bowls was held jointly with the Trinity Youth. Items were collected and sent to the Afghan refugees housed at Fort McCoy. Additionally, \$215 was donated through Lenten Coins to benefit CAP Services Emergency Shelter. Worship Committee

The 5:00 p.m. Facebook Live service on Wednesday night continues.

As we look forward to 2022, the Trinity Worship Team hopes to continue to provide meaningful worship experiences for our congregational family.

Trinity Lutheran Church Women

The activities of the Trinity Lutheran Church Women (TLCW) in 2021 were coordinated by a Steering Committee composed of Secretary Margaret Pitzrick, Treasurer Nina Heckler, Jane Goudreau, and Linda Woerpel-Radoll.

TLCW is affiliated with "Women of the ELCA", whose Mission Purpose is as follows: "As a community of women created in the image of God, called to discipleship in Jesus Christ, and empowered by the Holy Spirit, we commit ourselves to grow in faith, affirm our gifts, support one another in our callings, engage in ministry and action, and promote healing and wholeness in the church, the society, and the world."

Trinity's active Bible Study circles are Charity Circle which meets virtual the first Monday of the month at 6:30 p.m., and Joy Circle which meets at church the third Monday of the month at one.

The following explains the many projects that TLCW is involved with at Trinity.

Rummage Sales – No sales this year due to Covid.

Quilts - The quilting project at Trinity is alive and well. 246 quilts were made by seventeen women who participated during our work days, which are the second Tuesday and the fourth Thursday of each month. Also, several women spend many hours working at home to cut quilt blocks and sew quilt tops and backs. We rely on the congregation for donations of fabric. The quilt batting is purchased with rummage sale and Thrivent Action Team funds. Quilts were sent to the Lutheran World Relief Distribution Center and also distributed 7 locally through Operation Bootstrap. Wrapping a quilt around the shoulders of poor or hurting people of the world is like sending a hug and a prayer.

Baby Care Kits - 143 baby care kits were assembled. A kit consists of 2 receiving blankets, 2 shirts, 2 sleepers, 4 diapers, 1 hand towel, two 4 oz. bars of soap, 2 diaper pins, 1 hat and 1 sweater. Most of the sweaters are knit by women of the congregation and others by special friends.

School Kits - Charity Circle assembled 203 school kits. A school kit consists of 4 notebooks, 1 scissor, 1 ruler, 1 pencil sharpener, 6 pencils, 6 pens, 1 eraser, 1 box of crayons, and 1 string cloth bag.

Personal Care Kits - 120 personal care kits were assembled. A kit consists of 1 bath towel, two 4 oz. bars of soap, 1 toothbrush, 1 comb, and 1 nail clipper. Toothpaste is added later by LWR.

Thrivent Action Team funds as well as participation of the congregation with monetary and needed item donations has helped tremendously to enable us to assemble and distribute these kits in significant numbers. All help is much appreciated.

Prayer Shawl Ministry - Carlene Schanck started the Prayer Shawl Ministry in 2006 in an effort to comfort members of the congregation who may need encouragement and/or support. The Prayer Shawls are blessed during a church service. Four prayer shawls were delivered in 2021. Three were given to Pastor Diane Dardon' to use in her ministry.

Afghans for Graduates – An afghan is knit for each of our high school graduates. An afghan was presented to each of our 21 graduates in 2021.

Sweaters for Newly Baptized and Trinity Day Care Babies - Each newly baptized child receives a hand-knit sweater and blanket. These are delivered during a visit from a SPLASH Program representative. A sweater is given to each new baby who attends Trinity Day Care. One sweater was given out in 2021.

Thankoffering - is an opportunity to give thanks with a monetary contribution for our many blessings during the year. Thankoffering Sunday was held November 21st. We again this year appreciated and enjoyed the message given by Rev. Diane Dardon', Pastor Clay Schmit's sister. Donations were received and sent on to Women of the ELCA for ongoing and special projects.

Funeral Luncheons - Lois Hagen coordinated and advised the monthly teams of Funeral Coordinators.

Mitten Tree - Each December a Mitten Tree is set up. This year a donation box was provided by the church door and the congregation is very generous with their donations of mittens, hats, and scarves which are then sent to Operation Bootstrap for distribution.

Change and the need for creativity have become constants over the last year and a half in many aspects of life, including the church. This was the case for Living Christ Lutheran Church in Flagstaff, Ariz., even before a global pandemic caused many of us to rethink what it means to be church. Generosity from all three expressions of the ELCA (the churchwide organization, the Grand Canyon Synod and members of Living Christ) helped turn a congregation "on the road out of town, near the mall" into an online presence reaching over 500 people a week from Phoenix to the Philippines. (Read more about Living Christ in the current issue of "Stories of Faith in Action" at ELCA.org/SOFIA.)

Many other congregations have found new ways to connect both when inperson worship was impossible and when congregations began to return to their sanctuaries. Generosity, especially through Mission Support, helped us find and support these new ways of being connected. Early in the pandemic, ELCA Worship launched the "Worship in the Home" webpage, with Scripture, hymn links, prayers and reflections for each Sunday.

These resources were and continue to be used in congregations across the ELCA—even at Sitka Lutheran Church in Alaska, whose members printed and handdelivered "Worship in the Home" resources to fellow members without internet access.

Change and creativity have taught us many things. As Pastor Sandra Rudd of Sitka Lutheran Church noted, "The pandemic was a stark illustration of the fact that the church is not a building. A lot of people say that, but we didn't fully know it until we didn't have a building to use. We learned that there are many ways to be connected as the church." Throughout the pandemic, the ELCA has changed and adapted, doing ministry in new and creative ways, because of the generosity of its members. Even now, you may be gathering in a new way for your annual meeting, to discern how you will steward the gifts shared generously with your congregation to do ministry in your community and beyond. As you have these important conversations, remember that your gifts of time, talent and resources have helped create new spaces beyond our walls and buildings where we continue to worship, serve and love God and each other.
